# **Thought for the Month**

Growing up in rural North Yorkshire, some of our holidays were very definitely seasonal, as were the opportunities they afforded for casual employment. The last week of October saw a half term holiday that was informally known as "potato picking week", although I don't recall doing very much picking.

Summers were more likely to be spent in the fields and even as an incumbent in Devon, I would help one of my churchwardens with his harvest.

More recently, early September in Kent would see Ruth and me hand-picking hops for use at Larkins' Brewery and even now, it is a genuine community activity.

In the North of England, "Whit Week" was set aside for festivals and celebrations and in industrial cities, it would often be one of the few recognised opportunities for time away from home and work. In the countryside, farmers were always looking for seasonal labour and "Whit Week" was no exception.

"Whitsunday" occurs this year on June the 23rd and it celebrates the gift of the Holy Spirit on the first disciples after the Ascension of Jesus. The word is derived from the white robes that were worn by the newly baptised who were accepted into the Church at this time of year.

Today, the feast is more commonly called "Pentecost", from the Greek word "fifty", as it falls fifty days after Easter. For Jews, from whom the feast is derived, Pentecost falls fifty days after the Passover and according to the Mosaic Law (Deuteronomy 16. 9), it was on this day that the first of the harvest was offered to The Lord.

It is always worthwhile reminding ourselves how much our recreation and times of refreshment and renewal has roots in the natural cycle of the year and its seasons.

This is particularly true when we celebrate Pentecost. Those first disciples became aware of the presence of the Holy Spirit within themselves. It was a gift of God and one shared, not just by other believers, but all human beings.

We are made in the image of God and possess His spirit. It is this that enables us to share in the life of God our Father and call other human beings our brothers and sisters.

But Christians also believe that God created all things. All living beings share in this Spirit of God and that is why we should approach creation with reverence. We are renewed and refreshed through our presence in the natural world, not least because we are thereby enabled to share in the creativity of God himself. I am pleased that the

health and well being aspects of our encountering and enjoying the natural world are now being more widely recognised.

I hope that this Pentecost we will remind ourselves once again that God is present in His world. We can encounter God not just in each other but also in the natural world that surrounds us.

# **Country matters**

Late April – May. The dry spell has ended and at first the rain was welcome, but I think May can be called "a washout". Arid springs can cause great hardship for many species. Without supplies of fresh mud house martins and swallows can't build their nests. However this year both swallows and house martins were late in arriving, and swallows particularly are down in numbers; although house martins seem to be holding up. I will be so sad if our grandchildren don't see swallows and know the folklore that goes with them.

In times of drought, earth worms burrow deeper into the soil, forcing thrushes to hunt for snails to feed their nestlings, thereby causing badger cubs to slowly starve.

Mid May. The songbirds that have arrived on our shores from Africa (warblers, whitethroats, blackcaps etc) are insectivores but use the nectar of flowers and blossoms to fuel their flight. They switch to fruit at the end of the season to fuel their epic flights back to Africa.

In the hedgerows it is the turn of the dark leaved alexanders to produce flowers which grow up to 1.5 metres tall. They were brought over by the Romans (how do they know?) as a culinary herb to use the leaves in salads and pickling the flower buds and roasting the tap root.

The 'No-mow May' campaign is trying to save dandelions, daisies and other flowers from lawn mowers, weed killers and weed wands. It has been helped this year by the continual rain.

In Ashbrittle a nuthatch decided to use a nesting box. This is pretty unusual as they generally nest in trees, often using cracks in the branches or bark. Not only did the nuthatch use the nesting box but put mud all around the hole and along the edges under the lid!

On the Greenham end of the canal a cormorant was seen swimming. They are at home in salt or fresh water and often have communal nesting sites in trees around lakes or canals. They are generally seen by the sea perching with half-open wings to dry off the water.

Listen out for a cuckoo and watch for roe deer fawns to start grazing.

# Caring and its subversion, Part 3

Reduced to its simplest concepts, life is caring for the flow of information through time. Caring for genetic information includes propagation (= breeding), which I discussed in last month's *Parish News*. By being seen to care for people who say that they are derided for their diverse sexual preferences, caring can be subverted to a form of display. The same approach is useful in explaining why people care for existing copies of genetic information.

If we, individually, have no identical twin, the only way we can care for copies of genetic information that are identical to our own is by caring for ourselves. If we do, public opinion regards us as selfish. If we care for those parts of the same information in one of our relatives, some people might label it nepotism. If we care for a stranger of the same ethnic background as ourselves, and we decline to care for other strangers of obviously distinct ethnicity, it is racism. Finally, and with Samarian redemption in sight, if we care for a complete stranger, regardless of their gender, age, race, deformity, health, criminal record or prospect of living another day, it is likely to be seen by others as altruism.

The scale of increasing need in the previous paragraph is interesting because it contains a paradox: the further along that scale carers devote their time, the more appreciation and praise their efforts seem to attract, but that order of increasing need is precisely the reverse of how natural selection works. So, what is going on here? The explanation that occurs to me – and again, I beg contradiction based on evidence - is that being seen to care is a currency in the cycle of social display unconsciously occupies most people most of the time. (Look at me now - though I like to think that I am aware of it.) 'Social' because the reward to participants seems to be feelings of self-esteem, and they are probably caused by release of serotonin, dopamine and other neurosecretions. In searching for the good-feelingsrewards of social esteem, we need other people to be aware of our efforts; that is why we display them.

There is that complicated word 'why' which blurs into 'how'. Back to Niko Tinbergen and my first contribution to this column in April 2016. We display because it makes us feel good. We feel good because neuro-stimulators are released into our blood and cause pleasant feelings in our brains. Neuro-secretions are

released because external stimuli (e.g. a crowd of admirers responding to our showing off) elicit other nerve impulses which stimulate our genes to release instructions to secrete. Genes do this because those of our ancestors who did had more mating opportunities and so left more descendants than those who didn't. I keep telling you that life is sex.

In displaying our caring, we encounter others doing the same. Inevitably, this leads to competition between us and them. Competition causes us to seek diversity and this opens the way for selection. 'Increase', 'diversity' and 'selection' are evolution. Caring evolves, just as does its display.

So much for the mechanism, now for the story.

Throughout history, individuals and groups have represented the grievances of those who felt oppressed. In recent years concern about racial justice has joined other spheres of victimisation such as sexual preference and poverty, and included them under the blanket term 'Social Justice'. To this may be added the recent movement variously referred to as 'Black Lives Matter' and 'Woke'. 'Woke' is an Afro-American word for 'awake', as in 'Are you woke to the systemic racism in white people?'

Social Justice is an umbrella which Wikipedia summarises as the 'balance between individuals and society' but critics have called a political putsch masquerading as a moral principle that becomes an instrument of ideological intimidation for the purpose of gaining the power of legal coercion. In other words, caring has been subverted to become ammunition in the eternal competition cheered on by DNA.

Last summer, my college announced that it was abandoning excellence in scholarship as an aim in favour of the tenets of Social Justice. On 12<sup>th</sup> May – two days ago as I write this – I received the Department of Zoology's News Letter which was almost wholly devoted to the same.

The Department of Zoology, for Heaven's sake! It was the nursery of my life's work, and laid the foundations for achieving my secret ambition which was to understand what I am. Not what I feel I am, nor what I would like to be; not even what other people tell me I am, nor what they say I ought to be, but what I really am. I am really no more than a temporary combination of materials and energy whose behaviour is directed by a river of information that flows through time. What are you?

# **Matters Arising not Covered Elsewhere**

PM reported that the wording plate on the seat at Greenham Bridge was just readable and stated:

Bill and Peggy Wotton MBE in recognition of their long and dedicated service to Stawley Parish Council

It was agreed that the original plate should be reengraved.

The noise issue at the Pool Police Range was ongoing. The Clerk is in touch with the Clerk of Holcombe Rogus Parish Council and has agreed that we will offer support if or when required.

### **Date of the Annual Parish Meeting (APM)**

It was agreed that the APM will be held at 7:30pm on the 3rd June in Appley Pavilion.

### Finance

- Audit The Council reviewed the requirements of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return (AGAR) and concluded that:
- \* There had been no change to the risks faced by the Council in the past year which justified a change to the Risk Assessment.
- \* The Council could sign to agree to the statements made in Section 1 of the Annual Governance Statement.
- \* Section 1 of the AGAR; CW proposed and SB seconded that the Section had been completed correctly and the meeting agreed that the Section should be signed by the Chairman and Clerk.
- \* It was agreed that the RFO and Chairman would fill out and sign Section 2 of the AGAR with the figures from the agreed accounts which were distributed to the Councillors.

The Council recorded its thanks to Maurice Stanbury for his audit work this year.

### Insurance

It was agreed that the premium should be paid for the insurance which was in the third year of a three-year contract. The premium is £168.18p.

### Invoices

It was agreed that the following should be paid:

- Salt Bins invoice for £368.10
- Microsoft invoice for £54.72.

The balance of the account at the date of the meeting is £12,989.10, following the arrival of the precept of £2,927.

# **Planning**

• 35/21/0010- Prior approval for proposed change of use from agricultural building to dwelling house (Class C3) and associated building operations at Newhouse Farm, Kittisford Road, Stawley.

The Parish Council agreed to make no comment.

• The works being done at Greentop Farm, Kittisford were discussed. The Council thanked DM for his assistance in this matter and agreed to provide him with copies of the information on works being done on the site that will be sent to the Planning Officer.

### **Reports from Members**

**Roads** – The Council thanked SB for his time in placing the salt bins out and protecting them from over enthusiastic hedge trimmers with posts.

**Refurbishment of finger post signs**, previously agreed, will hopefully start in July/ August.

**Footpaths** – The possible problem with the path from Beardsley Farm to Greendale Farm has been proven to be false; the path is clear.

# **Date of Next Meeting** 3rd June at 7pm **Any Other Business**

The Council has received a request from the Rural Community Initiative (RCI) for a donation to maintain the defibrillators at the Shop and Kittisford and the VETS scheme. CW stated that the service now supplied through the RCI was good and the Parish Councils should be prepared to pay a share of the cost. PM will liaise with the other two Parish Councils to determine the level of support.

CW expressed his concern about the "dual hats" of the Chairman and Clerk. Advice will be sought from the Somerset Association of Local Councils (SALC) on the advisability of this system of running a Parish Council.

# Ashbrittle Parish Council Minutes of Annual General Meeting held on 28<sup>th</sup> April 2021 at 6.30pm

**Councillors Present:** Charles Doble (Chairman), Jeremy Robbins, Helena Massie, Vicky Hughes

**Minutes of previous meeting:** The minutes of the previous AGM held on 7<sup>th</sup> May 2019 were agreed as a true record and signed by the Chairman.

Election of Chairman: The Chairman stood down and asked if others wanted to stand as Chairman for the forthcoming year. No applicants had come forward from the existing parish council or the wider community and CD offered himself for re-election for a further term; this was proposed by VH, seconded and agreed JR and HM. Charles Doble was therefore elected as Chairman.

The Chairman was warmly thanked by all present for agreeing to continue in the role and for all the work he has done. CD thanked the councillors for their support.

The Chairman reported on events since the previous AGM. Many parish events had been curtailed due to the pandemic situation. This year, it is the Parish Council's intention to continue and increase its funding of charitable organisations that benefit the community.

The AGM concluded at 7.00pm and was followed by a regular Parish Council meeting

# Minutes of Regular Meeting held on 28<sup>th</sup> April 2021 at 7pm

**Councillors Present:** Charles Doble (Chairman), Jeremy Robbins, Helena Massie, Vicky Hughes

**Minutes of previous meeting:** The minutes of the previous meeting held on 16<sup>th</sup> May 2020 were agreed as a true record and signed by the Chairman.

Matters Arising: i) It was noted that the land adjacent to Stawley School had now been sold. ii) JR had replaced the vimpel to fly from the church tower in time for VE day and he has now sourced a supplier of stronger vimpels when a replacement is needed.

**Correspondence Received:** PCSO Louise Fyne sent her regular reports about crime and other policing matters within our area. A letter had been received from a parishioner concerning funding for the defibrillators (discussed below).

### **Reports from Councillors:**

Highways and Planning (Charles Doble) CD has spent much time contacting Highways, trying to ensure that pothole repairs are done properly as current repairs do not seem to last through the

seasons. He suggested a programme of repairing and re-painting road sign finger posts and it was agreed that specifications and quotes should be sought. Burrow Farm development is proceeding with the construction of a barn conversion and other dwellings. Other local planning issues had been resolved.

**Footpaths:** (Jeremy Robbins) JR is surveying footpaths to assess the signage. These will be replaced where needed. HM described the deep ruts which flood in Dark Lane. JR will assess the possibility of filling with hardcore to enable easier passage for horses and walkers.

**Finance** (Helena Massie) HM presented the accounts and noted that the election fee had been paid twice in a previous year. This year's fee will therefore come out of the pre-paid amount. The insurance fee has been paid and the burial grant has been paid to the PCC. Accounts will now be sent to the independent accredited auditor. The certificate of exemption is referenced as 8.3.28.04.21; this reference includes the annual governance statement and the accounting statement for 2020/21. HM was thanked for all her work collating and managing the accounts.

Charitable Giving A request from the RCI [Rural Community Initiative] for ongoing funding of the defibrillators, was favourably received and it was agreed that the matter would be decided once a discussion with Bathealton and Stawley PCs had taken place. The Chairman recommended a general donation to the RCI since, if specific to defibrillators there could be a liability issue for the APC. The community infrastructure levy aims to fund local, community-based projects so HM will ask the PCC and the Village Hall Committee if there are specific projects that require financial support. Other suggestions included the community website, the Parish News and refurbishment of the telephone box library.

Any Other Business: HM raised the matter of a large pothole and drainage problems on the access from the road to the back gate of the church. This is a shared road accessing properties, a parking area as well as the church. The Chairman confirmed it was on private property and therefore not a PC or highways issue.

The meeting concluded at 8.20pm.

# Margaret Aldridge 19th August 1932 – 26th April 2021



The funeral of Margaret Aldridge, aged 88, of Greenham, took place at Taunton Crematorium on Monday 10th May 2021.

Margaret was born at Burnt House, Hockworthy and went to school in Hockworthy and Holcombe Rogus – often walking to school with her friend Daisy Berry.

Most of her working life was spent looking after cattle, she was known as a very good stock woman. Margaret cared for all animals great and small; from her love of German Shepherds to an aviary full of canaries.

Margaret and her husband, Doug, came to live in Greenham in the 1950s to work for Mr Waller at Bishop's Barton (who, at the time, was in hospital after accidentally shooting himself in the arm). Sadly, Doug died in 1979, Margaret never forgot him and would not change anything in the garden that Doug had planted. Margaret's garden was most productive and she regularly won the annual Greenham vegetable competition.

In the 1980s her father, Dickie Cockhram came to live with her in Greenham and he took on many odd jobs around the village.

Margaret will always be remembered for; driving her MGB Roadster around the local villages, tearing along on her bicycle and striding out with her dogs, she always had a cheery smile and wave for everyone.

Margaret died at The Firs Nursing Home, Taunton and her funeral was well attended. Martin (at the shop) gave a splendid address which captured the spirit of the real Margaret.

Her ashes will be scattered in her garden at Greenham near to her beloved Doug.
