Thought for the Month

Taking a school Harvest Festival some years ago, I quoted the line about autumn being a "season of mists and mellow fruitfulness" and enquired if any of the children knew the name of the author. "John Keats, sir", they were very polite children, one eleven year old answered. "Well done", I said, "how on earth do you know that"? " You told us last year," he reminded me.

Autumn was never my mother's favourite time of the year, she said that it was all about death and decay, but I am rather fond of this particular season. Perhaps it is the promise of the schools returning after the long summer holiday, or the preponderance of hedgerow fruits, the changing of colour on the leaves or the prospect of casseroles replacing the barbecue.

We are enjoying a series of what are called in Kent, "Hop picking mornings" and certainly in Chiddingstone, where Ruth and I used to live, the hop picking for the local brewery is underway. In about three weeks' time, there will be a new beer on sale made exclusively from the hops that were hand-picked rather than gathered mechanically.

Whilst we notice and appreciate the cycle of nature, we also mark the movement of the weeks and months in the liturgical pattern of the church. Currently, we are in the Trinity Season that leads us towards the start of the observance of Advent at the end of November. October will see a number of Harvest Festivals in our churches and please make a note of some somewhat unusual timings of these services.

Remembrance Sunday will this year be marked at Stawley Church at 10.45 a.m. and we look forward to being able to have an indoor service, rather than the outdoor observance, due to Covid restrictions, last year at Ashbrittle.

We are already planning our Christmas services and look forward to being able to gather together once again, to sing carols and welcome the birth of Christ.

An ever changing world

The writer of the famous hymn, "Abide with me", wrote, "change and decay in all around I see" and if these last eighteen months have taught us anything, it must be that nothing is predictable and we live in a world of constant change and occasional seasonal decay. Already we hear that the government has both a Plan A and a Plan B, should the virus re-emerge causing a significant increase in hospitalisations. We shall have to await developments.

Whatever the future might hold, I hope that we are better prepared to take things as they are

and to adapt to circumstances as they occur. Our communities have impressed many others by our adaptability, our care and concern for our neighbour and our simple willingness to get on with life, whatever it might hold.

For the Christian, the holding of all our uncertainties within the love of God, has been a great comfort and source of reassurance.

Our decision to keep our churches open for worship during the first three months of this year, testified to the willingness of worshippers to meet each Sunday to worship that God of love.

May His presence remain constant in our lives and may our faith in Him deepen as we move, together, into the future.



Country Matters

AUTUMN: A Dirge

The chill rain is falling, the nipt worm is crawling,

The rivers are swelling, the thunder is knelling For the year;

The blithe swallows are flown and the lizards each gone

To his dwelling;

Come on white black, and grey,

Let your light sisters play –

Ye, follow the bier

Of the dead cold year

Late August; The sound of a high-pitched squeaking coming from the long grass was a sign of two or more little shrews engaged in a fierce debate. Shrews are very, very, territorial and the smallest European mammal. They are very different from other rodents and have to eat their body weight every 24 hours, so they spend most of their lives eating. The old English word shrew was also used to describe a bad tempered woman with a poisonous character.

Another animal seen at this time of year is the stoat. They are chestnut brown above with a sharp demarcation line to pure white underparts. They mainly feed on mice and rabbits but are very happy to have "take away" chickens which are free range, and are ruthless killing machines. **Early September**; The Himalayan balsam which lines the banks of the river Tone has migrated to the hedge verges above Greenham. The bumble bees and other insects love the pinky-purple flowers. It grows to about 2.5m and bullies out the native flowers, partly because it can shoot its seeds several metres.

The swallows and house martins were collecting together for the journey to Africa early this year. I think they might have used the North East wind to help them on their way. After they had discussed the route over Africa – Algeria or Libya - the first tranche left on September 12th. Some Swedish scientists fitted mini trackers to follow their migration; they were amazed to find that over seas and deserts their height was under 2km, but during the day they soared up to 8km. The conditions at this height are formidable; scarce oxygen, low air pressure, high ultra violet radiation and freezing cold. No one knows how these little balls of feathers of migrating birds manage at this height.

Other birds are singing again after moulting but not with the power of their springtime song, and the blackbirds won't really sing again until after Christmas. It has been a good year for butterflies, in spite of the up and down weather. Not cutting the verges and hedges has helped them and all insects. I counted 24 red admirals getting 'drunk' on my rotted plums one afternoon.

I was hoping to source some oak saplings to be planted around the parish to celebrate the 70 year jubilee but Anyway, I hope everyone who can will plant a native tree this autumn, preferably an oak.



Cyclamen hederifolium (Ivy-Leaved **Cyclamen or Sow-bread)**

This well-known and beloved late Summer and Autumn flowering plant is a feature of many of our gardens and one of around twenty three species of Cyclamen recognised today. A tuberous perennial producing distinctive flowers of magenta, paler pink singly on wiry stems with their white, characteristic twisting, back-swept petals from August to late October followed by variably shaped and patterned leaves, coloured from plain green through mottled shades to pure pewter-silver. They are often seen in more mature gardens where large swathes of self-seeded plants and saucer sized tubers may be visible on the soil surface under trees and shrubs or along woodland edges.

A member of Primulaceae (the Primrose family), this plant of Mediterranean origin has widely and long been distributed across Europe and other parts of the world where it is now frequently naturalized. It is generally accepted as the toughest and hardiest of the Cyclamen species though it does best in milder oceanic climates, going through a dormant period in the summer months whilst its seed capsules ripen. These are seen on spring-like coiled stems which, when ripe, split open exposing their sticky seeds that are naturally dispersed by ants (myrmecochory) discarding the seed after eating the sugary surface.

The name 'Sow or Swine-bread' is medieval in origin when it was believed that pigs sought them out to eat. The name Cyclamen is medieval Latin from the earlier Latin cyclamīnos which refers to the round tuber rather than the twisting petals of the flower as is often thought. For a long time, many of the tubers imported for the horticultural trade were collected by monks and local people from the wild, to supplement their income. This has, over the years, caused substantial depletion of wild stocks though nowadays the majority of plants found for sale are 10

propagated commercially from seed in nurseries. Cyclamen hederifolium are easy to establish in your garden and remarkably easy to grow from seed, either by letting nature and the ants do their thing (self-seeding) or collecting and sowing fresh seed in pans or trays of well drained compost topped with sharp grit. Once the seedlings are a year old, they can be 'pricked out' singly into small pots and grown on until large enough to plant out. They usually flower from seed from their third year onwards. They love a little dappled shade but will adapt to most situations, although they do not like sitting in the wet. They don't require any particular feeding but will thrive if a light dressing of leaf mold is applied either before flowering starts or when the plants go dormant in the spring. Whether seen in a garden or in the wild, there is nothing that lifts the spirits at summer's end like a huge drift of autumn flowering Cyclamen hederifolium.



Minutes of the Stawley Parish Council Meeting (edited)

held at Appley Pavilion at 7:30 pm on the 2nd September 2021

Parish Councillors present: Chairman, Paul Musgrove (PM), Simon Buttars (SB), Pat Sweet (PS), Matt Vellacott (MV)

Others present:- One parishioner, Dave Mansell (District Councillor) (DM), James Hunt (County Councillor) (JH)

4. Matters Arising not Covered Elsewhere

The footpath between Greenham and Cothay has now been cleared.

5. Finance

Invoices The SALC invoice has been paid. The Clerk passed over two invoices; one for the new engraving on the Wotton Memorial Bench and the second for printing paper.

It was decided that the now redundant website address www.stawleypc.org should not be renewed.

The balance of the account at the date of the meeting was £12,214.95

6. Planning

35/21/0016 - Appley Orchard Farm, Bishops Hill, Stawley. Variation of a Condition No. 02 (for the use of the extension hereby permitted for the storage and drying of woodchip and the use of a sawmill shall be carried out solely by the applicant and his spouse and limited to the applicant's benefit) and Condition No. 03 (the site to be used for agricultural purposes, storage and drying of woodchip and a sawmill only and no other purposes). The Council's view on this application was that this was a change of use that could not be considered as a simple variation to a condition of use of an agricultural barn. It also noted that the use to date had been for many hours outside those considered to be acceptable for use as a wood chipping facility.

The Council determined that it should object to the proposal and recommend that it should be considered by the Planning Committee, due to the number of local objections to the proposal, for change of use to a sawmill.

The Council tasked the Clerk to draft a response for circulation before submission.

8. Any other Business

Broadband A recent communication from Connecting Devon and Somerset states that businesses and households can apply for a voucher of up to £1,200 towards the cost of a mobile signal booster from a registered supplier if they are in a poor mobile signal area. The value of the voucher will be dependent on the type of technology most suitable for the premises

.Minutes of RCI meeting Wednesday 1st September 2021 at 8.00 pm

Welcome: The Chairman welcomed all members to the first face-to-face meeting since before lockdown.

Present: Michael Parkinson, Chairman (Mike), Pauline Wood, Treasurer (PW), Judy Webb, Secretary (JW), Laura Burrow (LB), John Hannon (JH), Cilla Newsom (CN), Ann-Marie Paterson (AMP), Martin Perry (MP),

Correspondence: PW had received correspondence about the details of the rental agreement for the shop and would be dealing with it

5a. Minutes of the last meeting: LB requested a correction of her name to Laura Burrow; the date of the 'next' meeting had been erroneously recorded. Amendments were recorded and the minutes were agreed and signed by the Chairman.

5b. Matters arising: Mike reported that the RCI Notice Board, discussed at the last meeting, had now been installed on the school railings. Keys would be held by the Chairman; the Shop; Louis Fleitz (living next door); Gerry Webb (Chairman SCA); Paul Musgrove (Chairman/Clerk Stawley PC). Notice about the new Notice Board would be placed in Parish News and Mike undertook to place in it, a copy the VETS map and any local information relating to the community. It was not intended for personal notices which can be placed in the shop. JW suggested it should contain contact details/picture of the local MP and County Councillor. JH thanked Mike for his work in getting the board made and installed.

6. Accounts: The Treasurer submitted her report showing the RCI Account's balances as at 31 August 2021 as follows:

RCI £118.86; Active Living £957.72; Youth Club £522.95

Total: £1599.53

The Treasurer expressed gratitude for the amount of donations received.

There was discussion about the Youth Club money retained within the account. LB was happy to organise some activity and had now acquired some circus equipment, but she would need some additional help with the running of Youth Club activities. She would place a request in the Parish News and CN agreed to arrange a meeting to discuss Youth Club plans.

PW requested the completion of the necessary Santander forms for all new Trustees including Martin Perry and this was done. The Charity Commission will be informed of the addition.

As Chairman, Mike raised the issue of Active Living funding which was now considerably reduced. The application was very complicated and PW would review how worthwhile it was.

VETS: JW reported that the VETS lines had continued to provide a general helpline. Although it had not been used, it was agreed that it was a useful and worthwhile service to provide within this rural community. JW thanked Pat Sweet in particular for her conscientious testing of the system.

She also reported that DeFib pads on each of the three CHT DeFibs had been replaced as required after 3 years. Their cost was covered by the CHT DeFib support for which we now pay an annual fee. JW had written to the Chairmen of the three Parish Councils requesting financial support for the maintenance of the DeFibs now that the Lottery Funding was exhausted. Stawley PC had contributed £100 and she would follow up requests to the other PCs.

Reports:

Lunch Club would be re-starting on 30th September. Before lockdown, it had reached the stage of being virtually self-financing but Village Hall Hire charges had increased from £25 to £30.

Most speakers/ presentations had been local and free of charge but we would need to build up numbers again.

Walking Group – this had not met during lockdown but Liz Taylor had started things in a small way so hopefully numbers would build up again to re-establish the Walking Group as a regular activity.

Oil Group - continues to work well

Walks Project – Some interesting walks by Annie Musgrove had been published in the Parish News. It was suggested that that these might be expanded into leaflets.

Arts Group – was due to be re-started on 8th September 21 - 2pm at the Village Hall. The possibility of an Exhibition or some displays of pictures in The Globe would be investigated by PW.

AOB: JH raised the issue of the state of some Public Footpaths in the area which were causing concern.

The path across to Tucks Farm, which forms part of the West Deane Way, is currently very slippery and dangerous and in need of attention.

Dark Lane is very overgrown and difficult to access as a Footpath although it is still just usable as a Bridle Way.

The corn crop on the Public Footpath from Tracebridge across to the Post Box at Appley effectively blocks the actual footpath unless the growing corn is trodden down.

The issue of these Public Footpaths needs to be raised with the County Footpaths Officer at Somerset County Council

The next meeting is to take place on Wednesday 24th November at Rose Cottage, Appley

The meeting closed and the Chairman thanked all those who had participated.

Did you know that we have a local community radio station?



10Radio is a community radio station run **for** our local communities by volunteers **from** our local communities. Its studios are based in Wivelis-

combe, serving Wellington, Milverton, Cotford St Luke, Bishops Lydeard, and the surrounding villages while its broadcast signal on 105.3 FM can even be picked up in parts of Taunton. It can also be heard across the globe, through the 10Radio and other radio apps and via the internet streaming service accessed through the web page at www.10radio.org.

Andrew Norris, the current chair of 10Radio (aka the Rockin Rev!) says, "At its heart, 10Radio aims to provide entertainment, information and opportunities for our local communities to grow and work together. It involves and encourages people of all backgrounds, ages and abilities in every aspect of running the station – from presenting, and playing music, to making programmes of special and local interest, or providing technical know-how. We welcome anyone and everyone."

10Radio started life in 2004 when a small group of local residents with an interest in community development read about a community radio station in Manchester and thought ".....wouldn't it be great to do it in rural Somerset as well? In September the following year, 10Radio was born with a month of varied broadcasts and taking its name from the 10 Parishes Arts Festival. A year later, the

second month of broadcasts attracted 200 presenters and 50 studio volunteers. Inspired by the success, a community radio licence from Ofcom was awarded and, following a frantic year of preparation, 10Radio was launched as a 24-hour, 7 days a week radio station in January 2008.

Coming out of lockdown, 10Radio has just re-launched its programme schedule and now boasts a weekday breakfast show providing music, news and information on local events and traffic conditions. There is a weekly community show where artists, local businesses and organisations, local government and organisers of events have the opportunity to share what is happening in this part of West Somerset. There are also a wide variety of music shows of a general, popular nature alongside programmes reflecting specialist genres from folk music to jazz and hard rock.

Outside broadcasts

10Radio's outside broadcast lorry is back on the road. Affectionately known as ALICE, it is fully equipped with a studio, PA system and stage facilitating music, announcements, and a performance platform for a whole range of community events, concerts, and fetes. Crucially, as part of its commitment to rebuilding our communities after lockdown, 10Radio is offering ALICE to local events and organisations in our communities **free of charge.**

Throughout the pandemic, 10Radio has become a local beacon providing information and updates on services, resources, amenities and support for people and businesses. It has also offered local, friendly voices as companions for the isolated and taken requests, dedications and messages to pass on to fellow listeners across the world. In its ongoing Home Service programme, 10Radio has also been able to bring acts of worship conducted by local worship leaders to the front rooms of those unable to attend church services.
