# Thought for the month

Last week I found myself in the Rockwell Green Church of England Primary School. I had been invited to attend a Year 6 class to answer their questions on all things "religious"! One of their questions was about the nature of sin; not something I often have to talk about with eleven year olds, but their enquiry was not so much about what it is, but why we do it. I tried in my response to make a distinction between our nature; who and what we are and our deliberate intention to do We all have different personalities, wrong. different strengths and weaknesses, varieties of Some of us are aspirations and inclinations. industrious, others less so. Many of us are sensitive whilst some are prone to selfishness. All these are the products of how we are brought up and educated in our early years. In addition, the strengths, weaknesses and personalities of our parents have considerable influence.

Identifying how we have become the person we are is at the heart of self-awareness. It is a process that requires reflection, honesty and, for the man and woman of faith, prayer. As I enter my eighth decade, I often ponder what has brought me to this delightful corner of England and made me the One of the greatest person I have become. influences on my life has been poetry. Not that I have written much of my own; I am afraid I lack the self-discipline, but I still enjoy the poems that I studied for 'A' level at school and still possess many of the books. Some of my favourite poets have also contributed to my spiritual life and I find in the writing of many Anglican poets, expressions of my own questioning belief.

In Lent this year, we shall be reflecting upon the lives and works of the Anglican poets. Our Lent group will meet at **Stawley Mill on Tuesday March 8<sup>th</sup> at 7.00 pm** for the first of these sessions and we hope and intend for each to occupy about an hour. The poets range from the seventeenth to the twentieth centuries, from Thomas Traherne, who some may not have heard of, to John Betjeman whom many regard as a personal favourite.

## Our buses are under threat

April 2022 was meant to augur in a new era for our buses. It was the month when the £3 billion as part of Bus Back Better, National Strategy for Buses for England, could be used to improve bus services. People could be invited to abandon their cars and opt for the 'greener' option of going by bus on journeys to nearby towns and villages. To improve buses across the county, Somerset had put in a bid for £163 million of Bus Back Better money. That was the sum of money Somerset needed because Somerset bus services currently are the worst rated of any county in England. But the Bus Back Better fund has been over subscribed 8 times by all the bids from across England and so it's unknown how much money Somerset might get. But it's unlikely to get anything like what Somerset needs.

So what can do? Could you please ... today ... send an email (doesn't need to be long) to the Government Buses Minister demanding that the Covid-19 Bus Recovery Grant funding is continued beyond April. ### **Stawley Parish Council Report**

The meeting of Stawley Parish Council on the 10<sup>th</sup> February at 7:30pm discussed the possibility of an incinerator being added to the waste treatment plant at Greenham. The Clerk was instructed to draft a letter to the County Council to express strongly held views. The letter stated that:

"The possibility of an incinerator being added to the waste treatment plant at Greenham Quarry has come to the notice of Stawley Parish Council and local people through an article in the Wellington Weekly News. It is understood that Somerset County Council has been asked to give their view on a "Scoping Opinion Request" (SOR) for the incinerator. The Parish Council is alarmed that neither the County Council or District Council planning officers saw fit to inform the Parish Council or local District Councillor about this approach from Wasteology.

Stawley Parish Council considered the SOR at its meeting on the 10th February 2022 and does not agree with the statement by the District Council that no objections should be made. In particular the request that certain topics should not be considered in any future Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) must be rebutted.

• More vehicles on a road with difficult bends will make an impact on the environment so must be considered in the EIA.

• The statement in the SOR that "the site ... has no ecological interest" must be rebutted; the surrounding quarry walls possibly have great ecological interest which may be affected by further development on this site.

• Finally the statement that "there will be no significant impacts associated with socio economic matters" is seen by the Council as totally false. Any further development on this site will impact the local community and must be considered in an EIA.

Stawley Parish Council is very concerned that this SOR only came to the Council's attention through a press article. The concerns expressed above are those of the local neighbours of this quarry and others within the Parish and must be considered in any response to the applicant. The Council also requests that any future applications made by Wasteology or their agents should be forwarded to the Parish Council before being made available to the press."

Any future news on this possible application for an incinerator at Greenham Quarry will be brought to you through the Parish News and the website at *https://stash.org.uk/*. Full minutes of the meeting can also be found on the website.

Don't forget that on the 10<sup>th</sup> March we will be having a presentation by Airband on the possibility

of having fibre delivered to our doors. Details of this are elsewhere in this PN but please note the time will be 7:00pm not the usual 7:30pm for the Council Meetings. This meeting is open to all residents of the local parishes including Ashbrittle and Bathealton.



# **Broadband Meeting**

7:00pm on the 10<sup>th</sup> March at Appley Pavilion



Airband has been contracted by Connecting Devon and Somerset (CDS) to deliver full fibre broadband to more than 40,000 homes and businesses in some of the most rural areas of Devon and Somerset by 2024.

# This is relevant to Ashbrittle, Bathealton and Stawley residents!

# All welcome.

They started surveying for the new network in April 2021 and over the next three years will be working closely with local landowners, communities, and parish councils, to connect thousands of homes and businesses with full fibre broadband.

They state that:

"Although CDS seeks to connect as many homes and businesses without superfast\* broadband (\*minimum 30Mbps download) as possible not all premises can be included within the public funding available. For all homes and businesses without superfast broadband which cannot be connected under these contracts, CDS will work the Government's Building Digital UK (BDUK) and the commercial sector to find alternative solutions. Although we cannot yet say exactly which homes and businesses will be connected until surveys and designs are complete, our teams are cracking on to get your areas connected

as fast as possible."


Stawley Parish Council have invited a representative from Airband to tell us what we can expect at a meeting on the 10<sup>th</sup> March at Appley Pavilion. If you want to have full fibre to the premises (FFTP) then it is important that you attend the meeting to make sure Airband understand that we need it here!

## *Narcissus cyclamineus* the Cyclamen flowered daffodil

At a time of year when our gardens are filled with all the different Narcissus cultivars and hybrids imbibing in us all the joys of the coming spring, my attention is usually drawn to the smaller, more subtle and (to me anyway) much more intriguing species daffodils of which, *Narcissus cyclamineus* is just one. At only 6-8 inches high this is a truly petite bulbous perennial with slender, rich-green foliage and vivid sulphur yellow blooms with fully swept back petals (perianth) exposing the long, tubular trumpet (corona). It is this reflexed perianth and its superficial resemblance to a cyclamen flower that gives the plant its common name.

A native of north-western Spain and Portugal where it is now, sadly, much depleted. At one time it was thought to be extinct in the wild though it has recently come back from the brink. The natural habitat of this miniature narcissus is usually river banks, moist meadows and the edges of damp scrubby woodland where it enjoys a cool root-run all year round and lime-free conditions. Unlike most other Narcissi, it resents being dug up and doesn't produce offsets in the way most other daffodils do; its main method of propagation is by seed and if happy, will self-seed prolifically, producing flowers by the third year.



If you've not come across this enchanting little bulb then do go to Knightshayes or RHS Rosemoor where they grow prolifically in light shade often amongst *Cyclamen coum* and *Erythroniums*. You may, if you are lucky, find some pot grown ones for sale as this is one daffodil you won't find as a 'dry bulb' in the autumn catalogues.

Over the years it has been much used in numerous breeding programmes and is a parent of an extensive range of (usually, much larger and more robust in size) 'cyclamineus' hybrids such as 'February Gold', 'Peeping Tom', 'Jack Snipe' and the ubiquitous 'Tete-a-tete'. Whilst these varieties have the characteristic swept-back petals and long trumpet, these features are softened by other elements in the breeding and are much easier to bulk up as these varieties readily increase from offsets from the main bulbs and are much happier to be lifted and divided.

I also want to mention our very own native daffodil. Narcissus pseudonarcissus SSP. Pseudonarcissus 'the Lent Lily' which though once one of our most common spring time wild flowers has seen significant reduction in numbers. Where it was once widespread throughout the country, it is now mostly restricted to the western side of England and Wales. Much of this is down to intensification agricultural and habitat mismanagement but also hybridization with garden daffodils means that in some places the remaining colonies have become rather varied and mixed in nature. We are very lucky to have some decent colonies around the five parishes; Ashbrittle churchyard, many local roadside verges, banks and hedgerows and along the river Tone. Value and treasure these delightful little gems and ensure their humble, nodding beauty remains intact for future generations to enjoy.



### Minutes of RCI meeting Wednesday 2nd February 2022 at 8.00 pm

Welcome: The Chairman hosted the meeting which again needed to be by Zoom because of current circumstances.

**Present (online):** Michael Parkinson, Chairman (MiP), Pauline Wood, Treasurer (PW), Judy Webb, Secretary (JW), John Hannon (JH), Cilla Newsom (CN), Ann-Marie Paterson (AMP), Laura Burrow (LB) joined the meeting at 20:45.

Apologies: Martin Perry (MP)

**Correspondence:** None except an enquiry to MiP from Suzette Williams about a Pavilion Notice Board and the possible costs. It transpires that there is discussion about the Playgroup and the Pavilion and JH was requested to consult with Cath Rose about any potential issue. (LB, who joined the meeting later, would also report back)

JW had received details about the Prince of Wales Award, presented at the Bath & West Show, for which the RCI had made an application two years ago. The award had been cancelled for the past two years because of Covid and lockdown but we had been invited to resubmit our application. JW undertook to re-write and submit a revised application in the light of recent events and circumstances.

**Minutes of the last meeting**: The Treasurer drew attention to the fact that the annual accounts had been omitted from the previous minutes but they could be re-submitted and included in this meeting. The minutes were therefore agreed and signed by the Chairman.

**Matters arising**: Following discussion at the previous meeting about footpaths, it was reported that posts and rails had now been installed along the path through to Tucks Farm making it safer.

PW reported that a new tenant had now been found for the Shop and negotiations for the handover/takeover were currently underway.

Accounts: The Treasurer submitted her report showing the RCI Account's balances as at 2nd February 2022 as follows:

The RCI annual accounts for the period 1st September 2020 – 31st August 2021 had now been audited by Derek Sowden and were resubmitted and are attached. The balance summary is :

Derek Sowden was thanked for his work on auditing the accounts and the Treasurer was thanked for her work on maintaining them.

PW commented that the previous 20% rebate on rate relief was no longer automatic and application had to be made; the resultant amount rebated could be anything between 0% and 20%.

**VETS**: JW reported that VETS was still running as a general helpline and she would recommend to Community Heartbeat Trust that it should continue this way. Pat Sweet was thanked for her conscientious regular testing of the system.

### **Reports**:

**Lunch Club** had restarted in November but the increase in COVID cases locally meant it had been cancelled in December and January.

**Walking Group** was still not meeting regularly although some group walking had taken place

**Oil Group** – next delivery was on 9 February

Walks Project – MiP will check up on leaflets

Art and Craft Group – is up and running but, with Village Hall rent now being £20 per session, a minimum of 5 people is needed to cover costs. It would now meet monthly on first Wednesday rather than weekly. LB undertook to promote the group through the school network and she asked about the possibility of a 'Mosaics Session' which PW would consider. This was essentially a 'Self Directed Art Group' and PW would put out a reminder by email when it was meeting.

**Youth Club** – LB had not had much response to her request for volunteers but she would coordinate a youth event during the Easter holiday.

**AOB**: JW wished to promote the Concert, 'Havin' a Larf!' with Steve Swan, Chris Britton, Phil Moore and others which would be held in the Pavilion on Saturday 30th April. Funds raised would be for Rossholme School in Kenya.

JH asked about plans for Jubilee celebrations in June. It is probable that each village will organise its own street party or similar with a bigger event to take place in the Pavilion in the evening.




