Thought for the Month

"God is love and those who live in love live in God and God lives in them." (1 John 4. v16)

Those words from the first epistle of St. John open the Marriage Service in the Church of England's "Common Worship".

They express the belief that those whose lives are marked by love have within them, the Spirit of the God who is Himself love. After two years of restrictions on weddings, due to Covid, this summer has seen a resurgence of couples seeking to marry in our churches and premises licensed for weddings. By the end of August, we will, I hope, have witnessed the marriages of no less than four couples in our group, a formidable number considering the extent of our combined populations.

Marriages are occasions of great joy. They are an opportunity, not only to witness the joy of a couple who seek to commit themselves to each other in mutual love, they are also times when we are privileged to be able to share in that joy and celebrate that love. Marriages are a time for the gathering together of the couples' family and friends, creating a wider community of affection and mutual loyalty.

The wider context

However, a marriage has a wider context. The Preface to the Marriage Service reminds us,

"In marriage, husband and wife belong to one another and they begin a new life together in the community."

And again,

"Marriage is a sign of unity and loyalty which all should uphold and honour. It enriches society and strengthens community".

In other words, a marriage is not simply the giving of one person to another in love. Nor is it just an opportunity for the couple's family and friends to celebrate the love and commitment of two persons. A marriage plays a part in the life of the wider community; it is a "sign" of the loyalty and unity to which human beings are called by God and by which, society is strengthened and its common life enhanced.

The experience of the Covid pandemic heightened our awareness of the merits of community. We learned afresh what it means to share our lives with others and thereby belong to something greater than the individual. We also rediscovered the value of sharing what we have with others and the giving of ourselves, in order that the quality of the life of others may be improved.

This sharing of our lives, this belonging to something greater, and this giving of ourselves in marriage, is how our society and community is strengthened by those who choose to commit their lives to another person in mutual love.

Minutes of previous meeting: The minutes of the previous meeting held on 15th February 2022 were agreed as a true record and signed by the Chairman.

Election of Councillors: CD, JR, HM and VH have all been nominated, completed the required documentation and were elected to the council. JPW was warmly welcomed to the meeting; he offered to serve as a parish councillor and was unanimously co-opted.

Matters Arising:

- i) Highways; no action has been taken concerning safety, access and signage on the A38 despite the best efforts of our Chairman and Sampford Arundel Parish Council;
- ii) Replacing and/or repainting the fingerposts, an estimate had been given of £3-4000 per post and further quotes will be sought.

Correspondence Received:

i) PCSO Louise Fyne sent her regular report about crime and other policing matters within our area. The next 'Cuppa with Cops' meetings at Wiveliscombe Silver Street Centre are on Wednesday, 11.30 - 12 on 10th August, 7th September and 5th October. Stawley Shop Beat Surgeries take place at 9-10 a.m. on Tuesdays 9th August, 6th September and 4th October.

Jubilee Celebrations: The Parish Council congratulated the Village Hall Committee and all the helpers who made the Jubilee celebratory tea so enjoyable for the many people who attended.

Reports from Councillors:

Highways and Planning (Charles Doble) There have been no reports of any planned surface dressing. A planning application had been received for Cards Farm, Tuckley Bridge Road for a change of use to a dwelling house; no comments were made.

Finance (Helena Massie) HM presented the end of year accounts which are now checked and closed. The certificate of exemption was signed and the minute reference is 220620 7.3. HM was thanked for all the work involved in keeping the

accounts. Charitable funding for this current year includes £100 to RCI for the maintenance of the defibrillator; £50 for the Jubilee edition of the Parish News and the Jubilee celebration expenses of £183.54.

Any Other Business: VH suggested the annual parish walk and JR will look at dates and routes for an Autumn walk.

A permanent Bring & Buy Book-Bazaar In Aid of Stawley Church

Stawley Church Fête generates funds which go towards the maintenance of the Church fabric. Among the side-shows at the fête, there is usually a table or two of books, most of them fiction, which people have generously donated. Storing unsold books has been a problem – until this summer when Penny Hare offered to display them permanently on shelves in her studio at Stawley Mill. This arrangement has the advantage that the shelves can be opened instantly whenever there is a 'happening' at the Mill, or by appointment.

Pricing is always difficult, especially when stock is donated and proceeds charitable. This year we have experimented with the idea of a bazaar. In a market, prices are declared, and the discerning shopper can compare them at different stalls. Things are not quite so simple in a bazaar because other factors are thought to be important:

- how rich the prospective buyers seem to be
- how much they feel that they need the book
- how much the bazaar keeper has sold since opening
- how much stock of this particular category of title is left
- how urgently the cash is needed.

Sellers mostly know what they will sell at, and buyers have some idea of what they are prepared to pay. The difference is usually settled by bargaining. Bargaining is an ancient skill, and its rules are adjusted according to many influences, such as region, tradition, race, apparent financial status, and sometimes miniscule postural or ges-

tural signals. Objectivity, reason and truth are seldomly deemed relevant to such exalted transactions as buying and selling.

At our **BRING & BUY BOOK-BAZAAR**, we have selected and combined parts of the above to arrive at our own philosophy:

- we pay scrupulous attention to objectivity, truth and reason
- we accept that different books will have different values to different people, and that this value may well be better known to the prospective buyer than to us
- we have some knowledge of open market prices and will try to steer customers towards them
- we are a charity and will not stand in the way of a donation, however small
- with these thoughts in mind, we invite you to make us an offer for any book displayed on our shelves.

It has been a very busy time for club members. It began, on a glorious summer's evening, with a 'Bring and Share' supper at Martin and Sue Jacoby's lovely garden. Twenty-two of us enjoyed a garden wander, admiring Sue's colourful borders and Martin's immaculate lawn edges, before tucking into delicious fare and generous quantities of wine.

The occasion provided a perfect occasion to thank Sue and Pauline most warmly for so skilfully running the Club for several years.

We then moved to a discussion of the Club's future, chaired by Val. The first task was to establish a programme for the remainder of the season, before turning to the knotty subject of Club leadership! It was unanimously agreed that Di Roberts would act as the new Programme Coordinator, Val Wall would provide 'press services' (mainly providing copy for the Parish News and sharing garden news with members) and Pauline Wood kindly volunteered to remain as Treasurer.

It was also agreed that these roles would last for a period of two years only, after which new volunteers would be sought.

Sanders Garden Centre.

Our first visit began with coffee and lunch, for five, at Sanders Garden Centre near Brent Knoll. This was followed by a visit to The Coastal Succulents Nursery in the nearby village of Rooks Bridge, where other members joined the group, though sadly not Shelley Ward, the instigator of the visit, who had succumbed to Covid. The fascinating collection of rare and unusual plants, with prices ranging from £4.50 to £500, was much enjoyed. Although it was impossible to resist some purchases, the higher priced ones were resisted! It was a good day.

Hampton Court Flower Show.

Penny Stanbury organised a coach trip to the Hampton Court Flower Show. She reports that the five members found the day hot and the journey long, deciding to walk the final three miles to beat the queue of traffic. Although the marquee was busy and hot, the gardens were enjoyed, despite the depressing plethora of wilding and the possible shape of things to come. Sue Kent, the disabled gardener featured on Gardener's World, took the People's Choice award. Her garden was small and perfectly formed with her daisy inspired interest. Finally, an attempt was made to convince Liz to buy a glamorous, glass shaded summerhouse. Though unsuccessful, the comfortable sitdown during negotiations was much appreciated the salesman wasn't fooled!

East Lambrook Manor Gardens The final visit, organised by Val, was to East Lambrook Manor Gardens, near South Petherton. 16 members enjoyed a leisurely (= generous term for slow service!) pub lunch, before meeting with Mike Werkmeister, the Garden's owner, who generously offered to give us a fascinating introduction to the Garden and its history. The Garden is listed by English Heritage as a Grade I Listed Cottage Garden. As such, it is the only cottage garden in the category in the country, so is very special. It was designed by Margery Fish, the grande dame of cottage gardens and author of many books (we were treated to seeing the first edition of these!). The garden only covers 1.5 acres, but its intricate design makes it feel much larger. It hosts an eclectic range of plants, some of which were first bred at the Garden. A small nursery stocks a range of unusual varieties at very modest prices. Needless to say, the visit ended with tea and cakes before members returned to their cars, armed with precious purchases!

A visit to a member's garden is planned for August and a visit in September, most likely to the wonderful gardens and landscape, of the National Trust's Tyntesfield.

COME AND ENJOY AN AFTERNOON
AT APPLEY PAVILION:

Some 'Sage' advice



With their exceptional diversity of habit and colour, *Salvias* provide a rich and rewarding experience for every gardener; with flowers of blue hues to rival those of the gentian as well as rich reds, pinks, whites and yellows, even almost completely black! From plants small and compact enough for an alpine garden, through herbaceous perennials to shrubs of two to three metres in height. Add to that some remarkably scented and textured leaves as well as culinary and medicinal applications and you have one of the most spell-binding and important genera of plants that you can grow in your garden.

Although there are over 900 species of Salvia worldwide, many are just not hardy enough to survive our winter climate without heated glass. Many species that come from Mexico flower exceedingly late, often November or December when it would be cooler in their home country but nearly always frustratingly cut down by frosts in the UK, just before flowering. They are, generally, easy to propagate from soft and semi-ripe cuttings and also in many cases from division or from seed. For most garden-worthy species and cultivars it is their later flowering which gives them great value in the herbaceous border, for pot-work and even in the woodland garden. Most Salvia species, gratifyingly, are very tolerant of a wide range of soils; even clay and thin alkaline soils, though a good supply of humus is recommended as moisture retention is very important for most to thrive.

Here are my five favourites, all are good starting points for what many horticulturalists see as the ultimate collector's plant.

Salvia patens 'Guanajuato' The 'Gentian Sage' is native to Mexico and has been long cultivated in this country and was noted by William Robinson in his book 'The English Flower Garden' for its intense royal blue flowers 'being surpassed by none and equalled by few other garden flowers'.

The form 'Guanajuato' was only relatively recently introduced and is considerably taller and with larger flowers of rich royal blue, impressive triangular leaves. Though *Salvia patens* as a species is often treated as an annual and is easily grown from seed, they will overwinter in milder climates and form tubers similar to Dahlias.

Salvia sclerea var. Turkestanica 'Clary Sage' is native to southern Europe and parts of west and central Asia and has also become naturalized in northern Europe and America. Its history goes back into antiquity with the Greeks using it medicinally and more recently, the oils being extracted for flavouring and for the preparation of incense. A robust, hardy and vigorous plant often grown as a biennial but frequently becoming a short-lived perennial, it has large hairy grey-green leaves which are topped by vast inflorescent bracts of pink, lilac, mauve and white tones. These give off a strong musky scent, particularly in warm sunshine, which some find unpleasant but I rather like! They will seed around your garden if they like you and they can be a little thuggish in nature.

Salvia involucrata 'Bethellii' Another Mexican species, the 'Rose-leaved Sage' is a fairly tall, robust and woody perennial which has grey green ovate felted leaves on stout, square stems topped with cerise-rose tubular flowers encased in pink bracts in late summer up to the first frosts. In the South West they will overwinter for many years if given some woodchip, ashes or compost mulch around the roots and crown. They are easy to propagate from soft and semi ripe cuttings and division of over wintered clumps in spring.

Salvia Leucantha 'Purple velvet' 'The Mexican bush sage' is a half hardy perennial which produces numerous long stems with lanceolate silverishgreen leaves (heavily felted with whitish hairs underneath) topped with graceful arching inflorescences of velvety purple. A really useful and beautiful plant to use in pot-work and container displays but will need to be over-wintered under glass.

Salvia 'Amistad' This herbaceous salvia has become somewhat ubiquitous in borders and large pot-work displays in recent years. Its tall, robust habit and flowers of the richest purple set in calyces of the darkest, metallic near-black which continue from mid-July until the frosts come, have made it indispensable to many gardeners. It is fairly hardy and best if not cut back too hard during winter. Best to protect the crown with mulch and cut back in late spring when the new growth is seen bursting forth. It is easily propagated by division and from basal cuttings.

A widowed friend of my brother's spent three days on the floor of his flat with a broken pelvis and out of reach of his phone, before his son realised that something must be wrong.

Foster Homes needed

There are children in our Somerset community who urgently need local foster homes, to allow them to continue attending their current school or college, and maintain stability in their lives. Anyone over the age of twenty one can be a foster carer, and there is no upper age limit – we have carers of all ages, from twenty one all the way up to eighty years old.

What matters most is that you have the time and patience to support a vulnerable young person in care. In return, you'll receive a weekly fee and allowance, as well as ongoing support from a dedicated Supervising Social Worker (for example, Mr Smith fosters nine year old Theo, and his fifteen year old sister. He receives £376.82 per week in allowances and £181.80 per week in fees). You'll also need a spare room, but you do not need to be a homeowner. You can foster if you are private renting or living in a Council or Housing Association property, and we may be able to discuss the possibility of a larger property with Homefinder if you don't currently have a spare room.

Many thanks to those of you who have shown appreciation for the 'Jubilee supplement', most of the credit of course must go to Avril who produced it.


And thanks also, to the Parish Councils who funded the extra cost.

The group have been holding some meetings 'in person' at members' houses where a large and well ventilated indoor space is available, but there may still be the need to have a Zoom meeting from time to time.



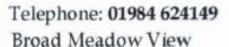


