Thought for the Month

On Sundays at our Parish Communion service, there are usually two readings; the first, more often than not, is an extract from one of Paul's letters to the young churches of Asia Minor, whilst the second is an extract from one of the four gospels. As there is little by way of accompanying explanation, many of these passages are difficult to understand.

Without a context or proper elucidation, the two readings and particularly the epistle, leave us with unanswered questions and a desire to know more about the world of first century Judaism.

Not long ago at two separate services, two people present both complained about the readings set for the epistle.

Whilst I shared their reservations, I thought it might be helpful to try and provide some background information about the four gospels and the writings of Paul.

This year's Lent course is entitled, "A beginner's guide to the New Testament" and the details are below. The "beginner" in question is the author of this piece, as I have always regarded myself as very much a novice when it comes to biblical scholarship.

Tuesday February 28th "What is a gospel?"

Tuesday March 7th "The first three gospels."

Tuesday March 14th

"Something a little different, the gospel of John."

Tuesday March 21st "Paul and his life."

Tuesday March 28th "Paul and his letters."

All of these will take place at **Stawley Mill** (with many thanks to Penny for her kindness and hospitality) and will begin at 7.30 p.m. Each of the sessions will be a "stand alone", one-off consideration of the subject, so please do not feel that you have to come to all of them.

It would be helpful if those attending could come armed with a Bible (any available translation will suffice) but I will bring along some extra copies just in case.

I hope that those attending will enjoy our discussions and appreciate the opportunity it offers for fellowship.

Some questions to get us thinking.

Why are there four gospels in the New Testament and who made that decision?

Why do Mark and John have no material relating to the birth and childhood of Jesus?

How often and when does Paul quote any of the words of Jesus which we find in the gospels?

In his book 'A Light that is Shining – An introduction to the Quakers' Harvey Gillman writes about the foundation of the Religious Society of Friends:

'I should put it this way: there is a creative, loving power in all people and in the world around. Many call it God, though it is beyond all names. Everyone can become aware of it directly by listening to its prompting in their hearts and in the hearts of others'.

Quakers feel more able to become aware of this power in the silence of their meetings for worship. In the quiet, they maintain the still, small voice can speak to them and direct their lives. The experience of quiet waiting upon God gives them strength to go back into the bustle of the world, the better to serve their fellows.

It is not in the institution of the church, nor in the hallowed pages of a book, that God is most keenly to be found, but in the human heart.

An Echo from the Past

Always running late! I'm the type of chap who, incensed by something in the news, decides to write a letter to a paper. By the time it's done and sent, the world has moved on. The topic is no longer a burning issue so the letter ends up in the editor's wastepaper basket!

As a case in point, two days ago was Valentine's Day. That meant a special meal out and a night away. The prices on romantic things were hyped up – of course. It's the day when all things loving are stressed and the incompatible are forgotten, at least temporarily. Perhaps the only consolation, when times are tough, like too much drudgery, and one feels put upon, is that Valentine wasn't a lover, but a martyr!

Perhaps we should look at his saint's day, February 14th. But what do we find in the list of feast days of saints? February 14th is not his at all. It's given to two other chaps, Cyril and Methodius, both Christian missionaries! Fancy giving your loved one a Cyril's Day card? Doesn't have quite the same ring? And talking of rings, he who proposes on February 14th might be wondering if there's any method in his madness?

Which takes me back to a Valentine evening a long time ago. At the next table, enjoying an expensive meal in a romantic setting, was a young couple. During the meal there arrived a huge bouquet of flowers for her. Then out came a box with a large ring inside it, followed by his proposal of marriage! Was she expecting it? Don't know. Did she accept his proposal? Don't know – she didn't throw her steak at him, so maybe yes. Did she have any choice?

Now that's an interesting question! How many use such occasions to take advantage, all in the name of love? Sometimes on television, in a news programme or entertainment show, a proposal of marriage is set up. She's out walking on Exmoor with her dog. The reporter and camera man are lurking. Over comes a helicopter with a streamer – "I love you, Cheryl: marry me!" it says – and her favourite song is being played across the countryside. Down he comes, dressed like Superman, out with the diamond ring. Down on one knee and proposes. Dare she say "No" – in front of the nation?

Maybe faced with such a situation we like to think we would say no. But do we? We don't want to seem to be kill-joys, spoil-sports – or even dull, boring and unromantic. But saying yes under pressure can lead to a long time of wishing otherwise. Easy after the event to regret it, isn't it? Perhaps instead of saying yes, we should say "Thank you, but can I think it over?" Could save an awful lot of pain!

It seems to me that all of us are almost

constantly being pressurised to be this, do that, buy something, go here, go there, make this choice or that one – because it's in someone else's interests that we give in. Even the Lord doesn't put that sort of pressure onto us. Often we don't even know it's happening. If we can't say no, then at least take time out to think. And find some courage and an alternative!

Register interest for full-fibre broadband

Connecting Devon and Somerset (CDS) are responsible for providing full-fibre ultrafast broadband in rural areas. Their first contract awarded to Gigaclear in 2016 failed and was terminated in 2019. At the end of 2020, CDS awarded a new contract to Airband to install full-fibre broadband in phases from 2021 to 2024 in Somerset West and Taunton.

The open access contract with Airband is the best hope for a full-fibre network in the parishes of Ashbrittle, Bathealton and Stawley. All are part of a cluster due to be installed by the end of 2024.

Airband have to complete contract delivery by the end of 2024, but are already running behind their original timetable, which is a concern. They have recently published a revised delivery schedule, which is thought more realistic given delays that have occurred. On the positive side, it is reported that Airband have established an effective core team and are now making good progress.

If Airband do not complete full contract delivery by the end of 2024, then rural delivery of full-fibre broadband should fall to the government's Project Gigabit programme, which is nationally directed. It is best that Airband fully delivers, but if there are any areas not covered when their contract ends, those areas will inevitably have a longer wait.

To help ensure Ashbrittle, Bathealton and Stawley are not missed out, it should help for households to register their interest with Airband. Enter your postcode at www.airband.co.uk. This will confirm if you are within the CDS contract and allow registration. Those shown as close to the network should still register, as the final list of properties to be connected will only be confirmed once the design stage has been completed. It may be possible to add some properties then, which is another good reason to register your interest.

Seakale - roll away the stones..



Observing the large, red-green buds starting to emerge and unfurl on my rhubarb plants and the need to dig out the forcing jars (or whatever buckets or large pots I can find) has put me in mind of another fantastic vegetable which will need darkness to blanch and force it into growth: Seakale.

Crambe maritima is a perennial member of the cabbage family (and closely related to that lovely herbaceous border perennial, *Crambe cordifolia*) and a coastal native of European countries including Britain and France. It is also found in the Baltic coastal countries and around the Black-sea region. Like Asparagus and Sea-Beet (*Beta vulgaris ssp. maritima*), It is Halophytic (Salt tolerant) and frequently grows amongst the ever-moving shingle and boulders of the fore-shore often stabilizing, trapping sand and helping to create dunes.

It was first noted as a food plant around the early 18th century when residents of coastal towns and villages were seen harvesting blanched shoots exposed by the Spring tides rolling away the stones. This led to a systematic removal of rocks from around the large established crowns and making as much use as possible of this fleeting seasonal bounty. When the crops started being supplied into local markets for sale, chroniclers started to take note and record information in horticultural journals which led to the first presentation to the Horticultural society of London on the cultivation and forcing of Seakale in 1805. It was recommended that a ceramic tube (forcing jar) was placed over the crown and fresh manure piled around which would produce heat whilst rotting and could force up to two or three crops from late December onwards.

It was gathered from the beaches of Sussex and served up for the Prince Regent, George IV when he stayed at his seaside retreat at the Brighton Royal pavilion. The courtly taste for the delicacy was renewed by Queen Victoria and Prince Albert; it was extensively harvested from the beaches around the Isle of Wight and Osbourne house but was also extensively cultivated and selected in the kitchen gardens of the gentry in the large estates across the country. The harvesting of wild crops so threatened the native populations that it was actively discouraged then banned during the early 20th century; it was also (like many other Victorian horticultural edible fancies) falling out of favour as a cultivated vegetable and rarely grown commercially or privately except in Europe where varieties like the pink-tipped variety 'Angers' and 'Lilywhite' continued to be grown for the market.

Recent interest in 'low maintenance' and perennial vegetables and the raising of its profile by some celebrity chefs has helped to bring Seakale back into our gardens and onto our tables; steamed lightly and served with butter, it is easily equal to Asparagus and once established is as easy and long lasting.

It is very accommodating about soils but appreciates a dressing of granulated seaweed and a good mulch in the early spring. Although its best to only take two or three cuttings of forced shoots in the spring, you will have the lovely crinkled glaucous-blue leaves topped with a vast spray of white flowers to grace your vegetable garden through the summer. The plants are best bought as root cuttings or 'Thongs' of named varieties but can fairly easily be grown from seed, A slight word of warning; some seed raised forms can be a little invasive but a tough resolve to keep the patch from spreading too wide will stop this plant from becoming a pain and keep it a pleasure.



Covid-19: still open for business & following Social Distancing Measures


