Thought for the Month

I hope and expect that by now, all our readers will be aware that the Wellington and District Team Ministry, of which the Ashbrittle group of parishes are a part, is engaged in a process of reorganisation. There are thirteen parishes in the current team, four in the Ashbrittle Group and we are to join with the parishes of Thorne St. Margaret, Sampford Arundel and Rockwell Green to create a new team. In order for this to happen, there will need to be a legal process of dismantling one team in order to construct another. The PCCs of St. John's, Wellington and West Buckland have met already, agreed a parish profile and an advertisement for a new full-time incumbent has appeared in the national press. It is to be hoped that the new priest in charge of these two parishes will be appointed promptly and in post by the autumn.

It is now the turn of the remaining parishes to begin their search for their new priests. The parishes in the east of the team are being reconfigured. Langford Budville and Runnington will be joining the Milverton group and the current vicar of Milverton will assume pastoral responsibility for both of them. The other eastern parishes will be joining the Cotford St. Luke group which is currently vacant and together they have begun their own search for a new incumbent.

Here in the west of the old Team, the first step is the holding of a public meeting, where representatives of all the seven parishes will meet to discuss their priorities when searching for and appointing a new priest in charge.

This meeting will take place on Tuesday June 27th at 7.00 p.m. and it will be held in Appley Pavilion.

Our new Diocesan Bishop, Michael, will be with us and he and our Archdeacon, Simon Hill, will be on hand to answer questions and listen to the views of parishioners. Charles Doble, who as the Lay Dean of the Tone Deanery has been fully involved in the process of re-organisation and appointments, will also be present. This is an important meeting and if you are unable to be present, please make your views known to your Churchwardens.

As an associate priest in the current Wellington and District Team, when the team ceases to exist, so will my post. But as I have written before, I will be on hand to assist your new incumbent wherever and whenever I am invited to do so.

Our Suffragen (assistant) Bishop, Ruth, will be preaching at the final service of the existing Wellington Team, when all our churches and their congregations meet for the last time. This service will take place at All Saint's Church, Rockwell Green on Sunday September 10th. There will be more details to follow in subsequent editions of the magazine.

I hope you will forgive me for using this important opportunity in the magazine to keep you all informed with the developments in the reorganisation of pastoral responsibilities for this area. Although it may all seem terribly "churchy" in the wrong way, I hope it does mean that a) everyone in our parishes know what is going on and b) you all have an opportunity to express your views about the kind of parish priest you would like. Whoever comes to be your "vicar", will be your priest and you will be able to turn to them for help, encouragement and advice.

In the meantime, as the Irish poet, Seamus Heaney used to observe, the swifts have returned and "all is well with the world." The majesty of the spring and early summer is reason for rejoicing. Despite the uncertainties of certain aspects of our lives, nature renews itself afresh.

Ashbrittle Parish Council Minutes of Regular Meeting held on Wednesday 26th April 2023 at 5.30 p.m.

Councillors Present: Charles Doble, Jeremy Robbins, Helena Massie, J. Pip Wilson and Vicky Hughes. There were no apologies.

Minutes of previous meeting: The minutes of the previous meeting were agreed as a true record and signed by the Chairman, CD.

Matters Arising: To be discussed later in the meeting.

Correspondence Received: i) PCSO Louise Fyne sent her regular report about crime and other policing matters within our area.

Reports from Councillors:

Highways (Charles Doble) CD has contacted the Highways Department about the condition of the

roads, notably potholes. This is a national problem. The short-term repairs are not cost effective for the county council who then need to re-do them each year; the traffic weight on certain roads is problematic as the surfaces are not designed for such heavy wear. JR and CD were thanked for the help they are giving concerning the tanker damage to the hedge and stone wall on Heniton Hill road.

Footpaths (Jeremy Robbins) A quote has been received for the replacement and refurbishment of the finger posts so this work will be carried out in due course. We discussed possible improvements to the footpath section down to the stream crossing at Marcombe Lake although this is a water run -off stream in the wet weather so it is difficult to mitigate the slipperiness of the slope. Discussion was also had about the footpath across the Bull's Field when horses are present.

Finance (Helena Massie) HM presented the accounts to date. The Certificate of Exemption was signed and minuted 2023.04.26.6. It was agreed that the accounts proceed to the internal auditors. The Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) has been received for the current year. The fund could be used for the fingerposts. Planned expenditure was considered for the year ahead.

Community JR has been in discussion with the chair of Stawley PC to consider any joint projects such as a renewable power generation scheme. Consultancy advice is being sought.

Any Other Business:

i) JR has purchased a new Union Jack flag to fly from the church tower for King Charles III's Coronation. After the summer, a new vimpel will replace the flag. The cost is c. £80.

ii) JPW will notify the parishioner who would like to join the parish council about the process.

Date of next meeting: to be arranged.

The meeting concluded at 6.30 p.m.

Every Rose has its Thorn.... but some more than others



'June, flaming June' (hmm, we'll see) is the month of roses. I am not the biggest fan of roses particularly a lot of the modern hybrids 'Garden' and recently developed modern shrub roses.

There are, of course, a few important caveats to that statement; I do love many of the classic 'ramblers' and the stronger climbers such as 'Kiftsgate', 'Seagull', and 'Paul's Himalayan Musk' and I adore many species and classic shrubs.

The first is really special... Rosa banksiae 'Lutea' a vigorous climbing rose originally from China which has no thorns, has fine semievergreen glossy green foliage and pale yellow, double flowers. It was first introduced into Kew gardens in 1807 and named in honour of Lady Dorothy Banks, wife of Sir Joseph Banks, the director of Kew. Although it has virtually no scent, don't let that put you off. If you have a sheltered, south facing wall this is most certainly the rose for you. Unlike all other roses, it is best pruned after flowering and can take quite heavy pruning as long as it's done during the summer. The resulting new growths can be tied in and trained during the seasons and the best flowering for the following year is produced on these.

The next rose I have a soft spot for is **Rosa moysii 'Geranium'**, a graceful arching shrub rose with matt, mid-green ferny foliage and large, single red flowers which appear from June onwards followed by large, bottle-shaped scarlet hips. It is also virtually thornless! Originating from Western China, this trouble free species can be grown in a sunny border or in light shade on woodland edge needing only annual removal of a few older stems to keep new shoots coming and thinning of material which might congest the centre.

This one is a bit of an oddity; **Rosa roxburghii** (Chestnut rose, Burr rose, Chinquapin rose) is a strong growing shrub rose with many thorns and interesting flaking grey-brown bark from the Nepal, Tibet and China. In the wild it grows in great thickets where the locals harvest the huge, orange-red chestnut sized hips which are rich in vitamin C. They are also grown commercially in China where the hips are either processed for rose hip syrup or dried and sold for herbal medicine. Its an interesting shrub rose to grow in the garden with its large, single, pale pink

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flowers and fine, ferny foliage. There is also a 'double' form in cultivation known as '*Plena*'.

Finally, a shrub rose I originally grew from seed and before then had never heard of. Many years ago I visited the JFK Arboretum in County Wexford, Republic of Ireland, where they had a fairly extensive collection of species roses and I think that's where I first saw this plant. **Rosa primula** (the Incense rose) which originates from China and parts of central Asia, has pale yellow single flowers and very finely divided, ferny, bright green foliage; it has many small thorns and produces small, brownish hips. Both the flowers and foliage are scented, particularly after rain on a warm summer afternoon hence its common name.

All the roses I've described above are relatively disease resistant, have interesting graceful forms and attractive foliage, bark, stems and fruit. They (and many other excellent species of old-fashioned shrub and rambling roses) are much better suited to the wetter, milder climate of the south west and particularly in the more informal, woodland and mixed style gardens that I'm attracted to. Some judicious seasonal pruning to shape and condition and a good mulch of wellrotted compost or manure around their roots is generally all they need to succeed.

The Parish Council's meeting in May was required to accept the accounts for the year 2022/23. Other matters discussed at the meeting included:

i) The movement of lorries to and from Greentop Farm still causes concern. Somerset Council's Enforcement Team are reviewing the case.

ii) The Council will renew the insurance with BHIB.

iii) An application for change of use from agricultural to holiday let / glamping at Wagtail Farm, Bullockfield Hill was discussed. A response will be made after consultation with local residents.

iv) The recently refurbished fingerpost at Greenham has a spelling mistake. Holcombe Rogus has become Holcombe Regis. This mistake was missed by all until a keen eyed part time resident noticed it a few weeks after installation. A new finger is on order so that Regis can become Rogus.

Wildlife Counts

Currently, the UK is among the most naturedepleted nations in Europe. With only half of its native wildlife remaining, it ranks in the bottom 10% of countries worldwide with respect to biodiversity. Even here in these countryside parishes, where the fields are covered with flowers and the air full of birdsong and the humming of insects, all is not as well as it may seem. In the last few years, the government declared a climate and ecological emergency across every parish and district of Somerset.

While we have undoubtedly lost a lot, this is not an article mourning our loss, it is an invitation to embrace the beautiful wildness that remains. What we have is still quite glorious and very much worth protecting.

In an effort to help nature recover across the county, the Somerset Wildlife Trust started the Great Somerset Wildlife Count. This initiative is enabling them to better understand which species are thriving and which need our help to recover. It is a large-scale, long-term and detail-oriented project which relies on the involvement of interested volunteer observers. So, in addition to their other data collection, once a year the Wildlife Trust invites everyone to join in the Big Count. For a few days they ask everyone to keep a look out for a selection of easily identifiable animals and plants across the county which can help them assess ecosystem health.

Just as regular check-ups can help monitor our health, regular wildlife surveys like the Big Count, can help scientists monitor the health of an ecosystem. In the past, the extent of some of the species' decline was only recognised after populations had reached near-extinction. For some there was no recovery. Now, with regular monitoring we are better equipped to identify trends in species populations and assist those in trouble before they reach a critical point.

This year's Big Count runs from the 16th to 25th of June and focuses on recording goldfinches; dragonflies and damselflies; bullfinches; birds-foot trefoil; frogs and toads; slow worms; snails; spiders; fungi and butterflies (speckled wood, small tortoiseshell, common blue, marbled white). Taking part in the Big Count can be an enjoyable way to engage with nature while doing something meaningful to protect biodiversity. Why not do some counts at your home and favourite nature spots? You can find more information about the Big Count and on how to get involved by searching for it at *somersetwildlife.org*.

Additionally, Frazer and I thought it might be fun to invite you to do some Big Count wildlife counts with us in some of the parish churchyards. We will be looking around for an hour at each churchyard recording what we see. Do join us - we'd be happy for the extra eyes and ears.

Deer watch

Being a passionate deer lover, I thought I'd share some information about the deer in our local area. There are two main species that we might see – roe deer (Capreolus capreolus) and occasionally red deer (Cervus Elephus). This article is about, to my mind at least, our prettiest native deer – the roe which have been around for 10,000 years, at least.

Roe deer inhabit field margins and patches of woodland. They are active throughout twentyfour hours but prefer to come out into the open at dusk and dawn. They feed by browsing selective shoots, leaves and buds of the local flora (and occasionally prize roses!). During the winter months you might spot them in the open fields in small groups. By summer, however, they have spread out into their individual territories.

At this time of year it is worth being aware that the females – the does – will be giving birth, often to twins. The kids initially have no scent and are usually tucked up in long grass by the mother whilst she goes off to feed. Sadly, every year well intentioned walkers spot the kids in the grass and assume they are orphaned, pick them up and take them to the RSPCA. If you do spot a tiny kid in the grass the Mum will not be far away - please leave well alone.

The main breeding season - the rut – takes place from mid-July to mid-August. During this period the males – bucks – will be competing for the females. The bucks are hugely territorial and will fight off any rivals (sadly sometimes to the death).

The best time to spot these lovely deer is early evening, unless you are a very early riser and can be up before dawn. Keep an eye out on the edges of woodland, you may see the does and last year's youngsters coming out of the woods to feed. Equally, you may also spot the bucks moving around the boundaries of their territory checking to make sure they can't smell any pretenders looking to move in on their patch.

The lack of a Chairman led to a discussion on how to move forward. JE posed the question, "Do we need an RCI?" She reminded us why the RCI was formed and we looked at what we do. The situation has now changed. Could the various activities / clubs be self-sustaining or done by another group? Welcome packs could possibly be provided by PCs. Could the lunch club become self-sustaining via Ashbritttle village hall? Mike has little input to the Oil group (would Judy Milne be prepared to continue?). JE happy to be more involved but not keen to be Chair.

Despite being quorate, with a decision about the whole future of the RCI needed, we decided to meet again with more members present to discuss:





South Wood Farm, near Cotleigh

On a glorious spring afternoon, members were able to enjoy this private garden which opens for a few days a year under the National Gardens Scheme. The garden proved to be a sheer delight and clearly demonstrated what vision (and not a little money!) can achieve.

The focal point is a 17C thatched farmhouse and outbuildings, all set within sixty acres of Devon farmland. In only fourteen years, the owner (Clive Potter), under the guidance of Garden Designer, Arne Maynard, has created an intimate series of gardens and wild areas. Tulips are a dominant plant in the spring and the property hosts a vast array of species – many of which were at perfection for our visit and showed well in their naturalistic planting. Topiary hedges and specimen trees add a pleasing touch to the garden, as do the vast number of espaliered apple trees.

The Kitchen Garden is extensive and constructed as a series of raised beds (the soil is shallow) made of intricately carved oak! The long greenhouse is a master class of precision and tidiness and made us all feel so humble about our own efforts that many retired for delicious tea and home-made cakes, before exploring the wilder areas of the garden! Many thanks to Penny Stanbury for organising this visit.

Burrow Farm Gardens, Dalwood

Members could hardly believe their luck when the rain stopped (at last!) and the sun shone for a wander around this most beautiful small garden. 2023 marks the 50th anniversary of the garden which was voted the Nation's Favourite Small Garden in 2021. This year it aspires to be voted the RHS best Partner Garden! The garden is a mix of formal and less formal areas of sweeping, albeit

soggy, lawns with an eclectic array of shrubs and trees. The owners have ingeniously blended the thirteen acre garden into the rolling hills of the surrounding countryside – providing sensational views from the garden's boundaries.

Plant Swap and Tea

In a spell of wet and windy weather, members met in Jo Hartas' garden and enjoyed an excellent tea (with posh crockery!) but in glorious sunshine. Jo prides herself in a garden for nature, so it was interesting to see how the tiered garden has responded to 'light touch' gardening. Her greenhouse shows how well one can accommodate a lot of pots in a small space. Members had contributed a wide range of plants to exchange, with all spares being 'acquired' for Stawley Fete on 3rd June. An additional bonus of the visit was to meet and see the superb craftsmanship of Michael Fairfax. Much time was spent in his workshop, admiring his visionary sculptures and musical instruments. Thank you, Jo and Michael, for contributing to this enjoyable afternoon.

June and July visits are scheduled for the organic garden at Yeo Valley and the National Trust's wonderful garden at Coleton Fishacre, Kingswear, Devon.

Last, but not least, as many members already know, Di Roberts has recently moved to Dulverton. Di has been a stalwart of the Club and has rarely missed an event. For the past months, she has also played a role in running the club – efforts for which members are very grateful. We wish her well in her new life and are delighted that she plans to join us for some future events. In the meantime, I plan to assume Di's role, that is, until my tenure ends next July when other volunteers will be sought.
