Thought for the Month

Quakerspeak

Following Ali Dominy's interview with the Oak tree at Spiceland Quaker Meeting House, I was inspired to reflect on my own attendance at Wellington Meeting. One of the many joys of attending Wellington, or indeed, any, Quaker Meeting, is the time-honoured use of centuries-old words and phrases. These can be baffling for newcomers. I am indebted to Ealing Quaker Meeting for their comprehensive jargon-busting site.

I could have done with reading this forty years ago! Here's a selection:

Discern – to seek the leading of the Spirit in reaching a decision, often in a Meeting for Worship for Business. Quakers love discernment about anything and everything and don't use voting to reach a decision.

Concern – an idea or prompting by the Spirit that leads a Friend to take on an issue as a personal crusade. The Friend will probably bring their concern to their business meeting to be tested, that is to see if it is a true 'concern' or simply a 'notion'. Quakers try to judge rarely, but deciding when something is a notion is one time when they do. Not the kindest term. Not often used.

Occur – as in 'This Friend's name would not have occurred to me', used when deciding on nominations of Quakers to particular roles as a way of disagreeing with whether an individual is appropriate for a role.

My Friend speaks my mind — said during business meetings when another Friend has just spoken exactly what you were thinking, and you cannot stop yourself from saying something.

Prevented – when a Friend can't make Meeting for Worship.

And here's two I'd never heard of:

Daffodil ministry – every spring a Friend notices how lovely the daffodils look as they come to meeting for worship, and they minister about how lovely the world is. Sometimes a pejorative term to describe uncritical and predictable ministry.

Popcorn ministry – There are days when everybody seems to have something to say at meeting for worship. There is little or no silence,

and people burst into ministry like a panful of popcorn on the stove. A pejorative term.

One of my favourites is **Right ordering** – the correct manner of doing things, in keeping with Quaker tradition and practice - a body of wisdom and insights that has evolved over three hundred years of seeking the guidance of the Spirit.

The English language is another source of joy and delight, with its own hotly debated rules for **right ordering**. I will re-visit this splendidly controversial subject in another article!



Silence

"Silence!" Shouts the angry teacher to their unruly class. Suddenly there is quiet, but the air is filled with the noiseless collective whimper of a cowering dog. Silence may be silent but not always quiet.

Consider the triumphant end of a grand symphony, coming to a loud crescendo, then stopping. Not a sound between then and the rapturous applause which soon erupts. That absence of sound for a few seconds has a lot to say, and all part of the experience of orchestra and people.

We all like peace and quiet. It rests us. It uplifts us. It is comforting like a cuddly toy, after a lot of noise, clamour and busyness. After a day spent in a city, touring the shops, we come home. If the weather is warm and sunny, we sit in the garden, cup of tea to hand, and admire the view. Peace. Silence. Apart from the birds twittering in the bushes, a distant throb of a tractor and an occasional breeze lisping through nearby branches.

"But my words like silent raindrops fell and echoed in the wells of silence." (Paul Simon)

Writers have spoken of the idea that the stars and planets have sounds, even music. It all looks very quiet to us. Suppose we were able to fly to the sun, in a non-inflammable spaceship: we go well into the outer flames of our star, and then open a window. What might we hear? Anything? Or a vast confusion of burning and explosions, too immense and terrifying to hear? The noise of London's traffic at rush hour would be silence by comparison.

Let's go back to the quiet garden. Imagine you are there. Close down on hearing the noise of your own breathing, and still the thoughts if only for a while. Listen. In the quiet, what do you hear? In the box below, jot down the noises you noticed, from the louder, more obvious ones, to the more distant, unobtrusive discoveries.

Did you do that? Did you enjoy it? What may have seemed like silence wasn't, was it? Yet if silence is made equal with quiet, then there was a quietness about it, sometimes inspiring, sometimes brooding, that depends, perhaps, on the mood.

You may like to take it further. You are still in your place of relaxation. Listen again to what you had been hearing. This time, in your

mind, your feelings, your inner being, try to reach out beyond what you've heard. Reach for the stars, if you like. Reach for the silence of the universe. Spend a while moving yourself out there, as far as you can. What do you hear?

Or rather, what do you sense?

That great silence has a power, even a presence that you become aware of, and that enfolds you as part of itself. After all, you are a being of your garden and of the universe, in the silence that's all around you.

That's what the Bible means when it says "Be still, and know that I am God." It's what the Christian knows as the basis of prayer.





The trees are thriving in our new wood!

We completed our summer maintenance weekend recently and it was really exciting to see how well the trees, that all you wonderful donors and volunteers planted in February, are doing.

From a personal perspective, we may not have been all that happy about the very wet first half to this year, but the trees have loved the rain which has helped them get off to a great start. A great relief after the type of severe droughts experienced in recent years where competition for water can mean saplings struggle and tree losses can be high.

We've recently inspected the trees and found around twenty trees that have not survived, which is only about 1% of what we planted. On average losses are around 10% so we're doing really well so far, though it's early days in the life of our trees and there are still likely to be more losses.

The weekend involved checking all the trees and guards and resetting any that had fallen over. The grass has grown long so sometimes these were hard to spot but in nearly all cases the sapling was still there poking up through the grass.

Where we could see that grass was growing inside the tube and smothering the sapling we lifted the tube and weeded around the tree to give it some light. Many of the tubes were clear of grass which could be because of the vigorous 'screefing' many were doing whilst planting in February. A special thanks to the 'screefers'.

Amazing growth

It was amazing to see how much the trees had grown; depending on the species some were already half way up the tube and several already surging out of the top. Some of the thorny shrubs even had berries!

We've also started monitoring biodiversity; plants, birds and insects, in the field. Steve, the ecologist at Protect Earth has suggested several types of surveys such as nesting birds, a butterfly transect and moth traps and we are enlisting 'citizen scientists' to help carry these out. It's going to be very interesting to track how it changes over time, hopefully for the better. Do let us know if you or anyone you know would be interested in helping out with this.

We have been impressed already by the number of butterflies flocking to the field, despite it being less than a year since sheep grazing was halted. We will keep monitoring, as the woodland develops, over the years (and decades), and keep you updated.

Looking ahead we will shortly be reserving the remaining 2850 trees to plant next February and will keep you posted on dates.



Stawley Parish Council Minutes of the Meeting held at Appley Pavilion at 7:30 pm on the 6th August 2024

Parish Councillors present: Chairman, Paul Musgrove (PM), Sarah Jones (SJ), Matt Vellacott (MV), Olga Dawer (OD) - see below.

Co-option of new Councillor – Olga Dawer was co-opted as a Councillor, signed the declaration of duties and interests and took part in the following parts of the meeting.

Finance: The current bank balance is £13,611.63. **Savings:** As part of the application to the Unity Bank a "business plan" has to be provided. A draft of this is being prepared and will be discussed and possibly approved at the next Council Meeting.

Planning

35/24/0005 - Demolition of part of school buildings with erection of a single storey 2 No. classroom primary school with relocation of canopy structure and associated external works at Stawley Primary School, Stawley. It was agreed that this application should be supported but a comment should be added highlighting the problems of traffic flow and requesting a sustainable transport report to encourage parents to make alternative arrangements to parking outside the gate of the school.

35/24/0006 - Application for Prior Approval for proposed change of use from agricultural building to 1 No. dwelling house (Class C3) and associated building operations at Stawley Wood Farm, Stawley Wood, Stawley, Wellington. No comment.

43/24/0065 - Application for a Lawful Development Certificate for the existing change of use of agricultural land to residential curtilage at Woodpeckers, Ham Hill, Stawley, Wellington. No comment.

Reports from Members

Roads – It was suggested that the turning to Cothay outside Greenham Barton was very dangerous because of a lack of a sight line towards Greenham bridge. This could be improved by the provision of a mirror on the wall of Greenham Barton. The owners of the house will be approached to determine whether they would agree to this.

Footpaths — Mr Melrose, who has been an excellent Footpath Warden in our area, may be redeployed. This may mean more self-help in the Parish for footpath maintenance.

Wivey Cares - an Introduction

Wivey Cares is a Charity registered project run by the community for the community. The activities of the organisation cover the 'ten parishes' which include Ashbrittle, Bathealton and Stawley.

Wivey Cares was set up in September 2019. In its first year it served one hundred and five clients and recruited eighteen Micro-Providers (Self Employed Carers) and twenty two volunteers.

We now have fifty Self Employed Carers, and in the current business year have dealt with one hundred and thirty seven client requests so far. Since our inception we have cared for more than five hundred clients!

Care ranges from companionship to full personal care. Our only expense is the coordinator who maintains a list of carers, receives referrals and sends a few to the person needing support. The client then choses the carer they wish to employ and then a contract is signed between the client and the carer.

This pioneering project has many benefits including:-

- local carers looking after the elderly in their own community
- hugely reducing costs compared to agency fees ... £10 per hour

The Sound of Church Bells

"If all the bells in England were rung at one time, there would scarcely be a single spot where a bell would not be heard." So said Bishop Latimer, pre-Reformation, in 1552.

In 1586 the ringers at St Margarets, Westminster were paid one shilling each for ringing "at the beheading of Mary Queen of Scots". Today bells are largely associated with churches, rung in anticipation of Sunday worship or special Holy days, or for weddings and funerals. Special events such as the death or crowning of the monarch, and national crises (invasion, victory or the end of Covid!) are also marked with the ringing of bells.

There are some six thousand churches in Britain with bells where regular ringing takes place. Some towers may have six bells, (mostly country churches), some eight or ten or even twelve bells (mostly Cathedrals). Each bell requires one ringer to pull on the rope to swing the bell and cause the clapper to hit the inside of the bell with a dong!

In this country the swing of the bell is controlled so that the bell can be held motionless in an upright position. This gives the familiar sound of 'one note at at a time' ringing as opposed to Continental ringing where the bells ring in a haphazard (but joyful) clatter.

A part of history

The weight of the bell can vary from some three hundredweight to over three tons. The heaviest bell in the county is the tenor in Wells Cathedral. Each bell has its own particular character to ring, depending on where, when and how it was cast and how it has been hung in the tower.

At Stawley we are fortunate in having three bells cast by the Exeter foundry between 1420 and 1440, two bells cast in 1871 and the lightest bell cast in 1902. Of these six bells, the tenor, the heaviest bell, weighs eight and a half hundredweight: the lightest bell, the treble, weighs three and a half hundredweight. At Ashbrittle there are six bells, whereas Kittisford and Bathealton only have four apiece. The tenor bells weigh eight, seven and seven cwt respectively.

So much for the local bells. The local bell ringers vary too in age, weight and character! We all enjoy the challenge of ringing as a team and keeping up a centuries old village tradition. We have recently rung for a local wedding and a funeral as well as helping out at a neighbouring tower when they were short of ringers.

If you would like to find out more, come and join us at our Thursday evening practice at seven o' clock in Stawley Church.

Gardening Club

Following last month's visits to Stogumber open gardens and 'The Secret Gardens of Bampton', on 25th July we visited the gardens at Marwood Hill Gardens, near Barnstaple. They cover an area of twenty acres in a steeply wooded valley. They were purchased in 1949 by Dr Jimmy Smart, a local GP and anaesthetist and keen plantsman. The whole garden is maintained by a staff of three employees, plus a number of volunteers.

The conditions are damp and mild and favour the cultivation of four National collections of one hundred and forty varieties of Astilbes, twenty two species of Tulbaghia, one hundred cultivars of Japanese Iris and the Marwood Hill Garden Heritage collection. This is a collection arising from seventy years of cultivation including the afore mentioned Astilbes, Camellias, Cornus "Kousa", Magnolia and Rhododendron, all named after the gardens.

Also on display are plants from Australia and New Zealand and many Champion trees with record-breaking girths.

Sixteen members of the club arrived for the necessary cup of coffee after which we were given a very interesting talk by the Head Gardener, Malcolm Pharoah. He has been tending the gardens for forty years and came back from retirement ten years ago to make some improvements!

After a morning strolling round the gardens in a light drizzle we returned to the café for a delicious lunch, after which we made an obligatory visit to the plant sales! Our thanks go to Brenda Hollick for organising this trip.

On 21st August twenty two members came together at Chackeridge for a Bring-and-Share supper. The views are superb looking towards the Blackdown Hills. The weather thankfully stayed dry but there was a chilly wind which was noticeable in the exposed positions. We had a leisurely stroll round both gardens, which were looking very trim, before gathering for a delicious meal provided by members.

The evening ended with a bit of a sing-song in the summerhouse. Our thanks go to the hosts Nigel and Ann-Marie and Gerry and Judy and all members for providing such lovely grub!


